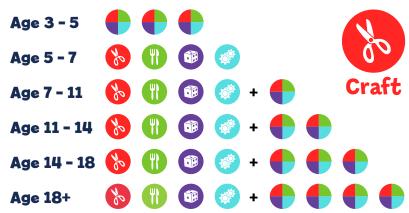




HOW TO: Use Your Challenge Pack

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- Oraw a picture of the English rose, the national flower of England.
- The bus is London's oldest form of public transport. Craft a double decker bus out of an old egg carton and paint it in its iconic red colour.
- England is known for its wet weather. Decorate an umbrella.

Did you know?

The wettest day recorded in England was in Cumbria on the 5th of December 2015 when 341.5mm of rain fell in a single day!

- Build a famous landmark from England such as the Eden Project, The Angel of the North, Hadrian's Wall or Brighton Pier using materials of your choice.
- Oid you know the toothbrush was invented in England in 1770 by William Addis? Use a toothbrush to create some unique paint patterns.
- England is home to the famous medieval knight Robin Hood, who stole from the rich to give to the poor. Robin Hood was also famous for his iconic bow and arrow. Make your own bow and arrow out of junk model materials.
- O Design teacup shaped invitations to invite friends to an English tea party.

Here's an idea!

English people are huge tea lovers, drinking around 100 million cups per day! That's a lot of teabgs! Why not create your invitations on tea stained paper?

- Paddington Bear is a famous children's book character who lives with the Brown family at 32 Windsor Gardens, London. Make Paddington's famous brown P.B. suitcase using an old shoebox.
- Put together an outfit for a English music festival such as Glastonbury.

Did you know?

Glastonbury festival was founded by Michael Eavis, an English dairy farmer. He set up the event in an attempt to get rid of his debt, and it quickly became one of the world's most famous music festivals. In April 2024, Michael Eavis received a knighthood for his services to music and charity.

J.M.W. Turner and L.S. Lowry are amongst some of the most well known artists of all time and are both English. Take a look at some of their most famous works or try creating your own masterpiece.

Tood Food



- Fish and chips is often considered England's national dish but what is the best accompaniment? Make or try different sides from your local chip shop such as mushy peas, onion rings or pickled onions.
- Afternoon tea was introduced in England in 1840 by the 7th Duchess of Bedford. Put together your own afternoon tea to enjoy with friends, family or members of your group be sure to include plenty of tea, scones with jam and clotted cream, sandwiches and other sweet treats of your choice.
- Enjoy a traditional English breakfast.
- Try a classic English pudding such as treacle tart, spotted dick, jam roly-poly or sticky toffee pudding. Don't forget to top with plenty of custard!
- Create an edible version of the English flag using white and red ingredients. You could create a starter using tomatoes and mozzarella or a sweet treat using strawberries and meringue.
- Cook up a classic English dish using sausages such as toad in the hole or bangers and mash.

Did you know?

Bangers and Mash supposedly got it's name during World War I, when food shortages meant that sausages were being made with different ingredients. The change in ingredients meant that the sausages exploded when cooked.

- Pies have been a popular food in England for centuries and have been enjoyed by many over time, including kings and queens at their royal banquets. Find a recipe for a sweet or savoury pie and try making it.
- Invent your dream chocolate bar by using a variety of different toppings. You could use sprinkles, sweets, biscuits or any other treat of your choice.

Why?

The first chocolate bar was invented in 1847 by English type-founder Joseph Fry.

- Find out the difference between a shepherd's Pie and a cottage Pie. Why not try both and see which one you prefer?
- Oid you know that Gloucestershire in England hold an annual cheese rolling event? Watch some videos of this event whilst enjoying some English types of cheese such as Stilton, Red Leicester or Wensleydale.

Games



- The Summer Olympic games has been held in England 3 times (1908, 1948 and 2012). Host your own mini Olympic games. You could even craft your own medals and add this to your craft challenge.
- Play a game of Sleeping Lions.

Why?

The Three Lions are featured on the England football shirt and have a rich history that dates back to the 12th century. The first lion appeared on Henry I's royal standard in 1100. After he married Adeliza, whose father also had a lion on his shield, Henry added a second lion to his standard to celebrate their marriage. In 1154, Henry II married Eleanor of Aquitaine, who had a lion on her family crest too. This bought the total to the royal standard. Later, Richard I, also known as Richard the Lionheart, made the three lions a symbol of the English throne. The symbol of the three lions still remains important in England and in 1996, a song called 'Three Lions' was released. The song became an anthem for England fans, sung to encourage the team during major football tournaments such as the World Cup and the European Championships.

- Play 'Oranges and Lemons' the playground game which refers to several of the churches close to or in the City of London. If you get caught on the line of "chop off your head" then you sit out.
- St George's Day is celebrated on the 23rd April each year. Find 23 red or white items around your house.
- Wimbledon is one of the most famous tennis tournaments in the world and is held in Wimbledon, London every year. Play a game of tennis with friends or family or learn some new tennis skills.
- O Hopscotch, Hide and Seek and Simon Says are traditional English playground games. Have a go at playing these or find some others to have a go at.
- In 2022, the Lionesses were crowned UEFA Women's EURO champions. Play a game of football or arrange your own tournament.
- England is famous for its pubs and inns. Play some traditional pub games such as Marbles, Dominoes and Backgammon.
- Put together a quiz full of questions all about the Royal Family. Who's knowledge will crown them the champion?
- London Zoo was the first zoo in the world to contain a children's zoo. Play a game of pairs, can you match the animal footprint to the correct animal?



- London is the capital city of England. Visit a famous London landmark such as The Tower of London, Big Ben, Tower Bridge, the London Eye or Buckingham Palace.
- England is home to over 4,000 castles. Take part in some of your own research to find out which castle is the oldest.
- Visit London's West End to see a show of your choice.

Did you know?

The Phantom of the Opera is the highest-grossing West End show of all time and on the 8th of June 2024 celebrated its 15,000th performance.

- The highest mountain in England is Scafell Pike which can be found in the Lake District National Park. It stands at around 3,209 ft in height. Go for a hike up your nearest mountain.
- William Shakespeare was from Stratford-upon Avon, England. Read some of Shakespeare's poetry and have a go at writing your own.
- Watch a film that is set in England such as The Theory of Everything, The King's Speech, Billy Elliot or Sense and Sensibility.
- Hold a debate. What is the correct way to eat a scone for a cream tea? The Cornish way with jam and then cream on top or the Devonshire way with cream before the jam?
- England is famous for the Royal Family. Find out about the history of the Royal Family and have a go at creating your own family tree.
- Much of the Harry Potter series was filmed in and around England, including locations such as King's Cross Station, Piccadilly Circus and Durham Cathedral. Spend the day at the Warner Bros. Studio Tour in London to experience the making of Harry Potter.
- Roald Dahl, A.A. Milne and Beatrix Potter were all famous writers of children's books in England. Read one of their classic stories.
- Visit a theme park located in England such as Alton Towers, Drayton Manor or, Blackpool Pleasure Beach or Thorpe Park.
- The Beatles are known as the best-selling artists of all time, selling over 600 million albums worldwide. Listen to some of their music.
