




HOW TO: Use Your Challenge Pack

PAWPRINT **BADGES

- Rococo and Neoclassicism were both popular art movements during the Georgian reign. Complete your own research to find out more about what these styles looked like.
- Fashion was very important during the Georgian era. Many men would wear powdered wigs, stockings, high boots and tailcoats. Women would wear hoop skirts and bustle gowns. Have your own recycled fashion show and try to recreate some iconic Georgian looks.

Here's an idea!

Dolls were a popular toy in Georgian nurseries. Why not create your own Georgian inspired doll characters? You can decorate wooden spoons to make the dolls and dress them in traditional Georgian outfits made from paper.

- The famous French painter J.M.W. Turner lived through the Georgian era. He produced many paintings and was known for his use of watercolours and oils to create beautifully coloured landscapes and seascapes. Have a go at recreating one of Turner's famous paintings.
- Paint a portrait of a family member or friend.

Why?

During the Georgian era, portrait painting became increasingly popular amongst royals, especially as a way to show off their wealth and importance.

- George IV had an exciting social life and loved throwing parties. Design your own invites to invite your friends and family to a Georgian themed party.
- The Industrial Revolution began during the Georgian reign in 1760. Build a 3D model of a factory with a smoke tower or a steam engine.
- Napoleon Bonaparte was the leader of the French army during the Battle of Waterloo in 1815. Craft Napoleon's military hat out of recycled paper or card.

Did you know?

The hat that Napoleon wore in the Battle of Waterloo was sold at auction for £245,000!

- raft a crown fit for a king using materials of your choice.
- George III reigned for 60 years and was the longest reigning British monarch before Queen Victoria. Construct a royal family tree.





- Drinking tea became increasingly popular with the Georgians. Try some different kinds of tea and compare them with one another. Which was your favourite?
- During the Georgian area, sugar sculptures were often created and displayed on the dinner table as a way to show off wealth. Have a go at creating your own creative masterpiece to sit in the middle of the dinner table using sugar cubes.
- Whip up a recipe that uses beef as the main ingredient.

Why?

During George III's reign, he was spotted burying a steak in the grounds of the castle as he believed that it would grow into a beef tree!

Afternoon tea was invented in the 1800s. Hold a traditional English afternoon tea and invite your friends, family or members of your group.

Here's an idea!

Why not try making your own scones? Start by greasing two baking trays and setting your oven to 220C/200C Fan/Gas 7. Put 450g of self-raising flour, 2 tsp baking powder and 50g of caster sugar into a bowl. Add 100g of softened butter and use your fingertips to rub the mixture together until it starts looking like breadcrumbs. Crack 2 eggs into a jug and then add enough milk to make 300ml of liquid. Stir the egg and milk mixture into the flour mixture to make a dough. Pop your dough onto a floured surface and knead lightly (you can add a handful of sultanas here if you would like to make them fruit scones)! Cut out rounds using a 5cm cutter and place them on the trays. Brush with milk or egg and bake for 12-15 minutes, or until golden. Leave to cool and enjoy. Don't forget to top with plenty of jam and clotted cream!

- Ice cream was a popular treat in the Georgian era and was only really served to monarchs at fancy dinner parties as it was a lot more expensive to make at this time. Make your own ice cream.
- People of higher class in the Georgian era would have sat down to enjoy a grand feast most evenings. The feast would have usually consisted of a fish dish to start, followed by a large roast dinner, a second course of pie and then a dessert such as a fruit tart or syllabub. Have a go at setting up your own feast table, filled with all of your favourite foods.
- Georgian monarchs enjoyed eating Mock Turtle Soup. Complete your own research to see what ingredients went into making it.

Games

- Chess was known as The Royal Game and was played by many monarchs, including George III. Challenge a friend or family member to a game or set up your own chess tournament.
- Play a card game of your choice. George II spent a lot of his spare time playing card games such as whist, piquet and basset.
- Backgammon was popular in the Georgian era. Have a game yourself with friends or family.
- Take part in a boat race. You could use toy boats or make your own out of recycled containers such as milk cartons or plastic cups.

Whv?

William IV was known as the 'Sailor King' due to his career in the Royal Navy that began when he was just 13 years old.

- As part of your create a crown craft activity, hold a crown craft competition! You can complete this challenge with a partner, or as a group. How will you judge your competition? Why not score each crown entry on size, elegance, jewel content, and sturdiness. You could even have a prize for the winner.
- Play Blind Man's Bluff, a game of tag in which the person 'on' is blindfolded.
- George III was known as 'Farmer George' due to his keen interest in agriculture. Play a game of Farmer Farmer.

How?

One person is on, they stand in the centre. Everyone else lines up at one end of the room and repeats the rhyme, "Farmer, Farmer, may we join your farm," the person who is in the middle then says "Yes, but only if you're wearing....." and says a colour. The aim of the game is then for those who are wearing that colour to get to the other end of the room without being tug. Once tug you must join the middle. Continue until one person is left, they are the winner!

- Hopscotch, leapfrog, catch, and bowls were all popular playground games for children in Georgian times. Have a go at one or all of these games.
- Jane Austen lived during the Georgian era and wrote six novels that still remain popular today. Some of her works have even been adapted into films and mini-series. Play the free match game on our website, where you can match each Jane Austen novel to the famous quote from that book.









Why?

Zadok the Priest was an original piece of music written by German-British composer George Frideric Handel. It was written especially for the coronation of George II in 1727.

- George III suffered with his mental health during his reign as king, but sadly during this time it was very misunderstood. Many Georgians believed that the cure to mental health problems was putting mustard on a person's cheeks which was of course a myth! Discover some other Georgian myths.
- The Georgian era was named after the four Georges who ruled Great Britain during this time. Complete a fact file for each of them using the free resource on our website to help you.
- Mozart lived during the Georgian reign and composed over 600 musical works, including over 40 symphonies. Listen to some of his works.
- The Battle of Waterloo in 1815 began in the middle of the Georgian reign. Visit a library to find out more about this battle or even plan a trip to Lion's Mound in Brussels, a large hill built to commemorate the battle.
- English writer Samuel Johnson lived through the Georgian period and became famous for writing the 'Dictionary of the English Language' in 1755. Johnson's statue can be seen in his birthplace, Lichfield. Take a trip to see the statue in real life.

Here's an idea!

Why not take it further and complete the Lichfield Pawprint Trail whilst you're there?

- George I was born in Germany before becoming the King of Great Britain in 1714. He wasn't very popular with the public at first as he couldn't speak any English only German. Have a go at learning some German using the free Germany vocabulary resource on our website.
- Hold a debate. Who do you believe was the best king during the Georgian reign and why?
- Visit Buckingham Palace in London. This famous building was bought by George III for his wife in 1761.
