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Craft

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-  Make a model of the Titanic using junk modeling materials. Check out our 'Titanic' board on Pinterest for some ideas on how to make a 3D model of the RMS Titanic. Maybe don't try to make a life-size model though...
-  Have a go at making an origami boat.
-  Hold a boat building competition. Challenge each young person to build a lifeboat out of a variety of different craft materials and then test them in water to see who has built the most buoyant lifeboat. Discuss why it floats the best in comparison to everyone else's.
-  Make a captain's outfit.

Did you know?

Captain Edward John Smith was often blamed for the sinking, but is said to have helped many children and women onto lifeboats during the sinking. The Captain sadly went down with the ship.

-  Draw your ship of dreams. The RMS Titanic was known as 'the ship of dreams' because she was the biggest and most beautiful ship in the world at the time of her maiden voyage.
-  Design an 'Official Certificate of Seaworthiness' detailing the Titanic's name and details. The RMS Titanic was required to have a certification of seaworthiness before it was allowed to carry fare-paying passengers and set sail on the seas.
-  Create a 'flashy' piece of head gear just like 'The Unsinkable Molly Brown' used to wear.

Why?

Molly Brown was a wealthy American socialite who supported the rights of women, children, and the importance of education. She was a first class passenger who survived the tragedy, showed true bravery in the disaster by arguing with the Quartermaster, and ordered that they go back to look for more survivors in the wreckage (she even threatened to throw him over board!)

-  Create your own 'fact or fiction' cards to play for one of your games activities.
-  Design and make a Titanic boarding pass. Maybe you could use these boarding passes as entry tickets to a Titanic party or evening dinner?
-  Build the Titanic out of building blocks or other construction materials.



Food

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 The RMS Titanic sank because it sailed into an iceberg that was thousands of years old and 50-100ft tall. Make floating iceberg drinks. Head across to our 'Titanic' Pinterest board to find out how to make these cool drinks.

 Dress in your best for dinner one evening.

Why?

For first class women, dinner outfits would have been an evening gown with long gloves. For first class men, a tailcoat, waistcoat and bow tie.

 Make or try a plum pudding. This dish was apparently the last meal eaten by second class passengers the night that the Titanic sank.

 The third class menu consisted of oatmeal porridge and milk, smoked herrings and jacket potatoes, ham and eggs, fresh bread and butter, marmalade, Swedish bread, tea and coffee. Make one of these dishes/use some of these ingredients for your breakfast.

Did you know?

For all classes breakfast was available on the Titanic between 8:30am and 10:30am, lunch was served from 1:00pm to 2:30pm and dinner was between 6:00pm and 7:30pm. However, because the Titanic wasn't actually at full capacity on its maiden voyage, some first class passengers could eat in the a la carte restaurant anytime between 8:00am and 11:00pm.

 Hold a Titanic themed evening meal, featuring a third-class starter, a second class main and a first class dessert.

 Bake a cake in the shape of the Titanic.

 Make a third class meal from the choice of soup, rabbit, bacon, beans, potatoes, biscuits, bread, semolina and apples.

 Write up your own menu for the titanic on some old style menu cards.

 Make mini pepper lifeboats. Find these on our 'Titanic' board on Pinterest.

 Vegetable dumplings and pea soup were available to second-class guests on the Titanic, according to survivor Lawrence Beesley. Try and make one of these dishes from scratch.

 Put together a platter of fancy 'high tea' sandwiches and pretend you're in the first class lounge on the ship of dreams.



Games

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 Work out how many lifeboats should've been aboard the Titanic to save every passenger and crew member. There were a total of 2229 passengers and crew members on board, but only 16 full size lifeboats that could hold 65 people each. The number of lifeboats was originally going to be 32 but it was thought the deck looked too cluttered with that many – what a big mistake that was!

Did you know?

After the sinking of the Titanic, only 713 of the 2229 people survived. Many of the lifeboats that were lowered from the ship were not at full capacity. 202 first class, 118 second class, 178 third class and 215 crew. That's 37% of all passengers! 61% of first class, 42% of second class, and 24% of third class passengers.

 Climb a building with 17 floors (plan something nice for when you reach the top). The Titanic was as tall as a 17-story building. Passengers could travel to the top decks using the grand staircase and the 4 lifts on board.

 The Titanic had a sister ship that was built first, called the Olympic. They are supposedly identical, though some people have found slight differences. Discover what these differences are.

 Play your chosen game of cards with a friend or family member. Guests who couldn't, or didn't want to, go in the swimming pool, gymnasium or squash court would read, play cards, dance or sleep for entertainment on the ship. They didn't have pre-organised activities on board then like we do on cruise ships now!

 Play a game of the Titanic Iceberg Crossing.

What?

A game of great teamwork and timing! Place 'icebergs' such as cushions or blocks across the room from one side to the other. The aim of the game is to get everyone across the room safely without anyone falling into the water. However, as soon as the first person steps from the first iceberg to the second, someone else must take their place immediately otherwise the iceberg 'sinks' and is taken away, making the journey across harder to finish. You can have more than 1 person on an iceberg at one time, but you cannot have 0.

 Have a go at marking the Titanic wreck site on a map. The wreck site coordinates are said to be 41°43'32"N 49°56'49"W.

 Step into the shoes of the passengers on the Titanic and re-enact the last night of its maiden voyage.



Other

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-  Watch the film 'Titanic' by James Cameron, featuring Kate Winslet and Leonardo DiCaprio.
-  Write a diary as if you are a passenger on the Titanic in first class, second class and third class. How different are your diary entries? If working in a group, you could all choose one to write and compare your 'experiences' on the ship.
-  Visit the Titanic museum in Belfast, Northern Ireland.
-  Learn how to swim or go swimming. Knowing how to swim is really important because it may be needed in emergency situations! I wonder if all of the Titanic passengers knew how to swim? There was a swimming pool on board the Titanic but it was only available to first class passengers.
-  Enjoy a massage. There was a full staff of attendants and masseuses on hand for first class passengers.
-  Pack a bag as if you're about to board the Titanic. What essentials would you pack? Try packing as if you were a third, second and first class passenger. It's likely that third class passengers only had a small trunk full of belongings, whereas first class passengers has several trunks full!
-  Listen to 'Nearer my God to thee' – the song played by the Titanic's musicians as the ship sank. Its said that they played music until the very end of the Titanic's sinking with the intent to try and calm passengers in the chaos, whilst lifeboats were filled.
-  For an extra challenge, find out who the Titanic band members were.
-  Discover the full passenger list for the Titanic in 1912. Are there any surnames you recognise? Why not try to find out if you had a relative on the Titanic?
-  Watch a Titanic documentary to find out more facts about the fateful night of the 'unsinkable' ship.
-  Learn how to sail or enjoy a boat ride.
-  Head out to a harbour or dock and see how far you can see with a set of binoculars. The Titanic's lookouts, Frederick Fleet and Reginald Lee, didn't have access to binoculars – they were locked in a cabinet that no one could find the key to. Oh how different the Titanic's fate may have been if they could've used a set of binoculars!
