




HOW TO: Use Your Challenge Pack

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- Paint a firework picture with materials of your choice. Fireworks are common at Lunar New Year celebrations. In Vietnam people believe they scare away evil spirits!
- Make a red money envelope, given throughout China at Lunar New Year. Download and print the free resource from our website.

Here's an Idea!

Why not make a blank envelope from red paper and try writing a New Year greeting in another language on the front? Red envelopes are given in many countries across Asia at Lunar New Year.

- Sew or glue your own hanging prayer flags, like those hung out on rooftops for Tibetan New Year (Losar). Flags are always hung in order; blue for the sky, white for the clouds, red for fire, green for water and yellow for soil.
- Create red decorations for your home or meeting place. Red is used throughout Asia as it symbolises luck, joy and happiness.
- The date of Lunar new Year changes every year as it is based on the lunisolar calendar. Find out more and create your own calendar for the year ahead.
- Find out about the art of lantern making and create your own paper lantern.
- Decorate a paper lantern; you could buy a ready made one and use tissue paper shapes to decorate it or create silhouettes using a black marker pen.
- Learn how to play GoStop, a traditional card game from South Korea that's commonly played on New Year's Day. Make or buy a set of cards and teach yourself this fast paced game.
- Sew your own Bok Jumoni (luck pouch).

What?

These little silk pouches are carried by many children in Korea and are used to store money after bowing to their elders on Seollal/New Year's Day.

- Make a greeting card for a New Year celebration. Use any specific names for the celebration and try writing your greeting in the language of that country.
- Build and decorate a circular or octagonal tray. The 'Tray of Togetherness' is used to present candies and sweets at Lunar New Year in Indonesia, and symbolises the family's sweet start to the New Year.

- Cook up mandu (Korean dumplings) to enjoy together at Lunar New Year.
- Have a go at making your own noodles, traditionally eaten in China at Lunar New Year and a symbol of longevity.
- Make your own Mut.

What?

Mut or Mứt Tết is a collection of candied fruits and vegetables eaten at Vietnamese Tet (Lunar New Year). People believe that eating sweet foods will bring them happiness, luck and success for the year ahead. For many, Mut is considered the soul of the festival.

- Try making your own Tteokguk (sliced rice cake soup). Popular in South Korea at Lunar New Year this soup is served as a special treat the slice rice cakes look like coins.
- Fry some khapse, eaten during Tibetan New Year. Making them together is an important part of preparation in Tibet and symbolises abundant food and a sweet life for the coming year.
- Bake your own Ul boov, traditional in Mongolia at Lunar New Year. The biscuits are always stacked in an odd number of layers to signify happiness and good fortune.
- Cook up a Guthuk.

What?

This traditional Tibetan soup is eaten on New Year's Eve. Made from nine ingredients it also traditionally includes dough balls that contain a rolled up piece of paper. On each piece of paper is a word that is a metaphor for a human characteristic. These words are said to represent the disposition of the person, for example, Charcoal for a cold hearted person and Wool for a gentle person. You could make up your own though!

- Cook some sweet chapatti (also known as Puran poli/Holige), traditionally eaten in India at Gudi Padwa/Ugadi, Hindu Lunar New year's Day.
- Dry your own Lychee Nuts. The dried flesh of the lychee, served like a dried fruit snack, is eaten with nuts in Indonesia, symbolising strong family relationships.
- In Indonesia, coconut symbolises togetherness and peanuts are thought to represent long life. Make a recipe of your choice for Lunar New Year with either of these ingredients.

Play a game of Yut Nori, a traditional Korean game played especially at Seollal (Lunar New Year).

What?

This game uses sticks instead of dice and how they land depends on how many spaces you can move on the board. Make your own board and have a game or two.

- Get competitive with kite flying and see how far, how high and how long you can fly your kite for. Why not make your own kite for your Craft challenge?
- Find the lucky coin in your 'dumplings'. In China, children search for a lucky coin inside their dumplings. Make some 'dumplings' of your own from play dough or salt dough and hide coins inside some of them. Take it in turns to choose a dumpling and break it open to see if you've been lucky.
- Build a biscuit tower as high as you can and discover the Mongolian tradition of Ul Boov, a biscuit stack made from imprinted biscuits and personal to each family.
- Practice your Sebae bows in a fun game of Lunar, Lunar, Lunar New Year.

What?

Like Duck, Duck, Goose, players arrange themselves in a circle with one player left to be 'on'. All the players in the circle bow as is traditional in Korea at New Year. Males should place their left hand on top of their right before kneeling on the ground and bowing, whilst females should place their right hand on top of their left. The player who is on, much like in Duck, Duck, Goose, goes around the circle saying "Lunar, lunar, lunar, lunar..." tapping each player on the head until they say, "Lunar New Year". The chosen player jumps up and chases the other all the way around the circle back to their starting place. If the player who is on catches their chosen player then they swap places.

- Make a set of Mahjong tiles and learn how to play. A popular game across Asia and played to help pass the time until midnight on New Year's Eve.
- Guess the answers to riddles. In Indonesia, riddles are hung from lanterns paraded at The Lantern Festival (the 15th day of the New Year, marking the end of the celebrations). Drums are sounded when the answers are correct.
- Discover some of the traditional ankle bone games played by families in Mongolia on the eve of Lunar New Year and have a go at playing one of them. Make your own set of counters or ankle bones to get started.
- Create your own game based on Lunar New year traditions.

other other



- Calculate your Korean age. In Korea, people's international age changes on their birthday whilst their Korean age (which starts at 1 year on the day they're born) changes at New Year. Is your Korean age the same or different?
- Find out if the dates of Lunar New Year change in different countries. Why is this? Can you find out?
- Clean your home or meeting place in preparation for Lunar New Year. In China, many families clean before the holiday so that they're not washing away any good luck at the start of the new year.
- In Vietnam, many consider it unlucky to throw anything away on New Year's Day. Try not throwing anything away for a day and see how much waste you create? What could you do to reduce your waste?
- For many families, New Year is a time to think about family members passed and in some countries families will visit the graves of their loved ones. Find out where some of your family members are and visit to remember them.
- Plant an orange seed and try growing your own citrus tree, given as gifts in Indonesia to friends and relatives.
- Arrange a family get together. Across the world the Spring Festival is a time for reuniting with family so get together with yours!
- Many Korean people travel back to their family homes during Lunar New Year. Take a trip to see where your parents or grandparents were born or grew up.
- Watch a dragon dance or take part in one, a common event throughout Lunar New Year celebrations across Asia.
- Visit some traditional Lunar New Year celebrations near you or invite others to celebrate with you. Why not enjoy some of your traditional foods and enjoy some games together?
- Host or visit a Lantern Festival to conclude your Lunar New Year celebrations. Why not use your homemade lanterns?
- Colour in all the countries where Lunar New Year is celebrated on a world map. Have you got a local community celebrating near you?
- Create your own Lunar New Year display with your own feasting table full of foods from across the world!
