




HOW TO: Use Your Challenge Pack

Games

Food

- Adapt activities as necessary to meet your needs.
- Add your own activity ideas or develop them into projects.
- Use what you have; don't buy in lots of new materials/equipment.
- No need to send us evidence, responsible grown-ups decide when the badge has been earned.
- One challenge badge can take as long as you like; from a few hours to days or even a full term!

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& Craft

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- Make your own museum in a shoebox. What will you choose to exhibit?
- Put together a costume and dress up like something you might find in a museum such as an Egyptian mummy, someone from the Victorian era, or even a dinosaur skeleton.
- Craft your own museum tickets. Why not use the Design Your Own Tickets resource on our website to help you get started?
- Paint your own masterpiece fit to display in an art gallery.

Did you know?

The Louvre in Paris is the largest art gallery in the world and is home to around 35,000 pieces of art - including the famous 'Mona Lisa' by Leonardo da Vinci.

- Try your hand at an old fashioned craft that you might see in a museum. Why not try making your own paper doll or learning how to knit a shawl?
- Model your own dinosaur skeleton. Can you learn the names of the different bones for your Other challenge?
- Have a go at pressing flowers in order to preserve them.
- Make a plane out of junk model materials.

Did you know?

The Imperial War Museum was set up during World War One to record the experience of people living through war and conflict. Now there are 5 branches, including IWM Duxford where you can get up close to historic aircraft and even see some of them fly.

- The Bayeux Tapestry can be seen in a museum in Normandy, France. It's 70 meters long and was made in the 11th century. Have a go at embroidery or design your own tapestry that tells a story.
- Create a collage with tickets you've collected from different museums.
- Design a poster to advertise a museum. Why not tell people what they can see at your local museum, or set up your own museum for your friends and family to visit? You could even make a visitors' book for people to sign.
- A zoetrope is a type of old fashioned animation that is often found in museums, where a sequence of images are viewed through slits in a spinning cylinder. Have a go at making your own zoetrope or flip book.

T Food



- Put together a packed lunch for a trip to the museum.
- Have a go at following an old recipe, such as one for a wartime treat from the days of ration books.
- Taste test some old fashioned food such as Spam® or aniseed balls. Do you like them? How are they similar or different to the food you eat today?
- Make an edible museum.

Here's an idea!

Why not make an exhibition of your favourite foods, or lots of foods that share the same colour. You could even recreate a museum that you've visited using only edible materials.

- Bake bread in the shape of a museum of your choice. The architecture of museums can be very different. For example, the Louvre has big glass pyramids outside but the British Museum has lots of pillars.
- Decorate a cake to look like an artefact that you found in a museum.
- Construct a dinosaur skeleton from the popular twig shaped savoury snacks.
- Paint your own edible masterpieces with colourful icing and construct an art gallery exhi-biscuit wall.
- Make aeroplane propeller marshmallow pops. Head to our 'Museum' Pinterest board to find out how to make this delicious snack.
- Try making a local recipe that would feature in a museum about the town, city or county that you live in.

Did you know?

Staffordshire is known for its oatcakes which are a bit like savory pancakes. Similarly, the Cowper and Newton museum in Olney, Buckinghamshire has information about the pancake race tradition that originated in the town.

- Learn how to conduct some food based science experiments like the ones you might see demonstrated at a science museum. Why not have a go at using vinegar to make a bouncy egg?
- Visit a food themed museum, such as Cadbury World in Birmingham or the Wensleydale Creamery Visitor Centre in North Yorkshire.

Games

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- Have a game of I Spy... during a trip to a museum.
- Play 'I went to the museum and I saw a...' as a twist on the classic alphabet memory game played in a group.
- Try some old fashioned games such as Victorian hoop rolling, or Cribbage.
- Complete a treasure hunt in a museum.

For Leaders!

You could provide a photo trail or a list of questions to your adventurers. Then they can look for the artifacts in the photos or the answers to the questions as they explore the museum. Why not award points or prizes to the player or team that finds the most?

- How many types of museum can you name in one minute? Why not take on more rounds to name the artifacts you might find in each type?
- Take part in a toilet roll wrapping race to make your own Egyptian mummies.
- Complete our Howard's Hieroglyphs resource to discover this ancient alphabet. Why not count this towards your Howard Carter Challenge too?
- Museums exhibit artifacts that each have their own history. Collectively, these objects and individual stories fit together to tell a bigger story about a subject or period of time. Complete a jigsaw to piece together a picture.
- Test your fine-motor skills in an astronaut themed game involving gloves.
- Sort some household waste into the correct bins. Younger adventurers could sort by whether things can be recycled or not and older adventurers could separate by materials.

Why?

'Treasure in the Trash by Nelson Molina' is a museum in New York City that is exhibits a huge collection of items that people have thrown away.

- For your Craft challenge, have a go at constructing your own miniature trebuchet, similar to one you might find at a medieval museum such as Warwick Castle. Then see how far you can launch your payload. Why not go head to head with a friend to see who can make the best trebuchet?
- Dig for dinosaur bones in a natural history themed sensory activity.

Other



- Take a trip to a museum.
- Put together a time capsule that describes what your life is like. What will people learn about us during a trip to a museum in a few decades or even centuries time?
- Create your own museum and tell a story with objects. How do these artifacts describe or represent your subject?
- Write a review for your local museum. What did you enjoy and why should other people visit?
- Plan a trip to a museum. Think about how you'll get there, what time you'll need to leave and how much money the tickets will cost.
- Anne Frank's diary has been translated into more than 70 languages as an account of people's experiences during World War Two. The original copy is on display in her house which has been turned into a museum. Start writing your own diary to document your life, or have a go at reading Anne's.
- Coins are often found in museums and The Royal Mint Museum's collection includes over 80,000. Have a look at some old or foreign currency. How is it different to the money you use?
- Make a timeline of the key events in your life.
- Watch 'Night at the Museum' or a similar film or television programme.
- Read a book about a museum, or have a go at writing your own museum story. Why not make some illustrations for your Craft challenge?
- Wisit an antiques shop or village.
- Find out some extra facts about something that you saw during a trip to the museum. Which was your favourite exhibition and what would you like to learn more about?
- Make a donation to the museum that you visit if you're able to. Lots of museums are free to enter in the UK, but they rely on the donations of visitors to maintain their exhibitions.
- How many types of bird can you name? The Natural History Museum in London is home to a total 2,500,000 birds of over 9,000 different types; holding the Guinness World Record for the largest collection of birds.
