




HOW TO: Use Your Challenge Pack

If you are unsure or have any questions about these terms of use please email info@pawprintfamily.com Paint a picture of a cherry blossom tree. Why not use cotton balls dipped in different pink colours to create the look of the petals? You could even use scrunched up tissue paper to add texture.

Did you know?

Cherry blossom is considered the national flower of Japan and is widely celebrated as it is believed to represent rebirth, new beginnings and the start of spring.

- Onstruct your very own paper lantern. Not sure how? Check out the tutorial on our 'Japan' Pinterest board.
- Craft some sushi using craft materials of your choice.
- Create some Koinobori streamers. Cut out scales using colourful paper before sticking them to an old toilet roll tube. Then attach to a wooden stick using string so you can wave it around and join in the fun!

Why?

In Japan, The Children's Day Festival is celebrated every year and families pray for health and happiness. The Koinobori is significant within this celebration as it symbioses courage and strength due to it's ability to swim up a waterfall.

- Design your own kimono using felt tip pens, pencils, paint or different coloured paper. Head to our 'Japan' Pinterest board to find the template.
- Put together a traditional Japanese folding fan by using half a paper plate and some wooden sticks. Why not decorate it with a pretty floral design?
- Make your own climbing stick complete with stamps.

Why?

Whilst climbing up Mount Fuji, hikers can purchase a climbing stick to assist with their journey, as they get further up the mountain they can get their sticks stamped with the elevation and station number.

- In Japan, the koi fish symbolises luck and good fortune Why not make some art based on koi fish? You could craft a collage or even try origami.
- Celebrate Girls' Day by crafting some Hinamatsuri Dolls! Use toilet paper rolls, felt tip pens and glue along with the free doll design template that can be found on our 'Japan' Pinterest board.
- Assemble a model of the Itsukushima Shrine out of old recyclable materials.

Tood Food



- Make some sweet sushi using rice crispies, marshmallows, sweets and fruit.
- Bake and decorate some biscuits to look like the Koinobori kites.
- Use a cocktail stick with some pink food colouring to decorate a marshmallow. This gives an amazing finish, making it look similar to a cherry blossom tree. Perfect if you have some leftover marshmallows laying around in your cupboards!
- Prepare your own bento box.

Why?

A 'bento' is the Japanese version of a home-packed meal. It usually consists of a carbohydrate (such as rice or noodles), a protein (usually fish or meat) and variety of seasonal fruit or vegetables. The bento box is a great way to promote a healthy, balanced diet which is very important in Japanese culture.

- Whip up a Japanese themed buffet for your family and friends.
- Steamed rice, miso and grilled fish are traditionally eaten for breakfast in Japan. Why not switch up your morning cereal and give it a try?
- Create the Japanese flag using different foods. You could place raspberries in a circle on a tray of yogurt.

Did you know?

The red circle on the Japanese flag symbolises the sun with it's official name being 'Nisshoki' which translates to 'rising sun flag'.

- Visit a Japanese restaurant.
- Try making some onigiri in the shape of your favourite animal or character.

What?

Onigiri is a traditional Japanese food made from wrapping white rice in a dried, edible seaweed called 'Nori'. It can be made into a number of different shapes and is the perfect snack for on the go. This is also a great way to avoid food waste if you have any leftover rice left at the end of the day.

- Find a nearby cafe that sells bubble tea and give it a try.
- Have a go at making some Japanese fruit sandwiches using your favourite types of fruit.

Games



- Roll sushi across the table and see who can get their's to fall off the end first! For an additional challenge try not using your hands. To avoid food wastage you could buy some discounted sushi at the supermarket, alternatively you could decorate ping pong balls to look like sushi and use these for your race.
- Play with a Kendama, a traditional ball and cup game played in Japan, Due to being similar to a French 'Le Bilboquet', you could also count this for your France Challenge too!
- Enjoy a traditional game of Otedama.

How?

During this game, bean bags are tossed and juggled. It can be played alone or with a group of people as a social game.

- Use origami to create a paper fortune teller.
- The Sudoku was introduced in Japan. Have a go at completing one. You could even play with a group of friends and use a timer to see who can complete it the fastest.
- Have a go at playing Mahjong.

Here's an idea!

Create your own Mahjong tiles. Each set of tiles is made up of at 136 tiles but most commonly 144. Use the traditional symbols or create your own. One of the most expensive Mahjong sets ever cost a whopping \$1.07 millions dollars and was made from Tanzanian ruby!

- Take part in a game of Sushi bingo using our free resource.
- Complete a word search on a Japanese theme. Find one online or have a go at creating your own and challenging your family and friends to find all the words in the fastest time.
- Challenge your friends to a game of Keidoro, a game played by children in Japan that is very similar to the popular playground game Cops and Robbers.
- Go head to head at a game of Janken (Japanese Rock, Paper, Scissors) and discover the Japanese words for these items.
- Japan has hosted the Olympics four times in total, the most recent being the Tokyo Summer Games in 2020 (held in 2021). Hold your own sports day.



- Did you know that over 80% of land in Japan is mountainous? Visit a local mountain or even try climbing one!
- Manga is a Japanese style of comic and graphic novel. Why not read some or even have a go at drawing some of your favourite characters?
- Visit a Japanese museum such as Japan House in London.
- Japan is known for its immaculate gardens. Visit some local gardens and see how many Japanese flowers you can spot.
- Fujinomiya is home to Mount Fuji, the second-highest volcano located on an island of Asia and seventh-highest peak of an island on Earth. Have a go at putting together a volcano experiment using washing up liquid, vinegar and bicarbonate of soda and count it towards your Volcanoes Challenge.
- Watch a film or documentary based on Japan.
- In 2018, Japanese DJ Sumiko Iwamura received the world record for being the oldest professional club DJ at 83 years and 118 days as of 25th May 2018. Why not turn your home into a club by turning down the lights and creating your own playlist for your family and friends to enjoy?
- The largest seafood market in the world is located in Tokyo, Japan. Try some different kinds of fish or seafood.
- Learn some words in Japanese.
- Read a book about Japan.
- Complete your own research on Japan. What fun facts can you find?
- Sing along to some traditional Japanese children's songs such as 'Chouchou' and 'Shabondama'.
- Write your name in Japanese using traditional Japanese calligraphy. What other words can you write?
- The koto, shamisen and taiko are instruments that are classically used in Japanese music. Listen to some tracks to find out what they sound like.
- Sumo wrestling is Japan's national sport. Watch some videos of sumo tournaments.
